

## Segregation in the U.S.



Even though the Constitution stated everyone was equal, segregation continued in the United States until the 1960s. It continued by segregating facilities, services, and opportunities such as housing, medical care, education, employment, and transportation. Lesson: Fighting Against Segregation



A civil rights protest where 4 young African–American students sat at a white lunch counter at Woolworth's in Greensboro, North Carolina, and refused to move after being denied service. This began a protest movement that spread across the South. These protests eventually were successful and forced many establishments to change segregationist policies.

These laws were put into place in the South after the Civil War. They were state and local laws that enforced racial segregation even though the Constitution stated all were equal.
