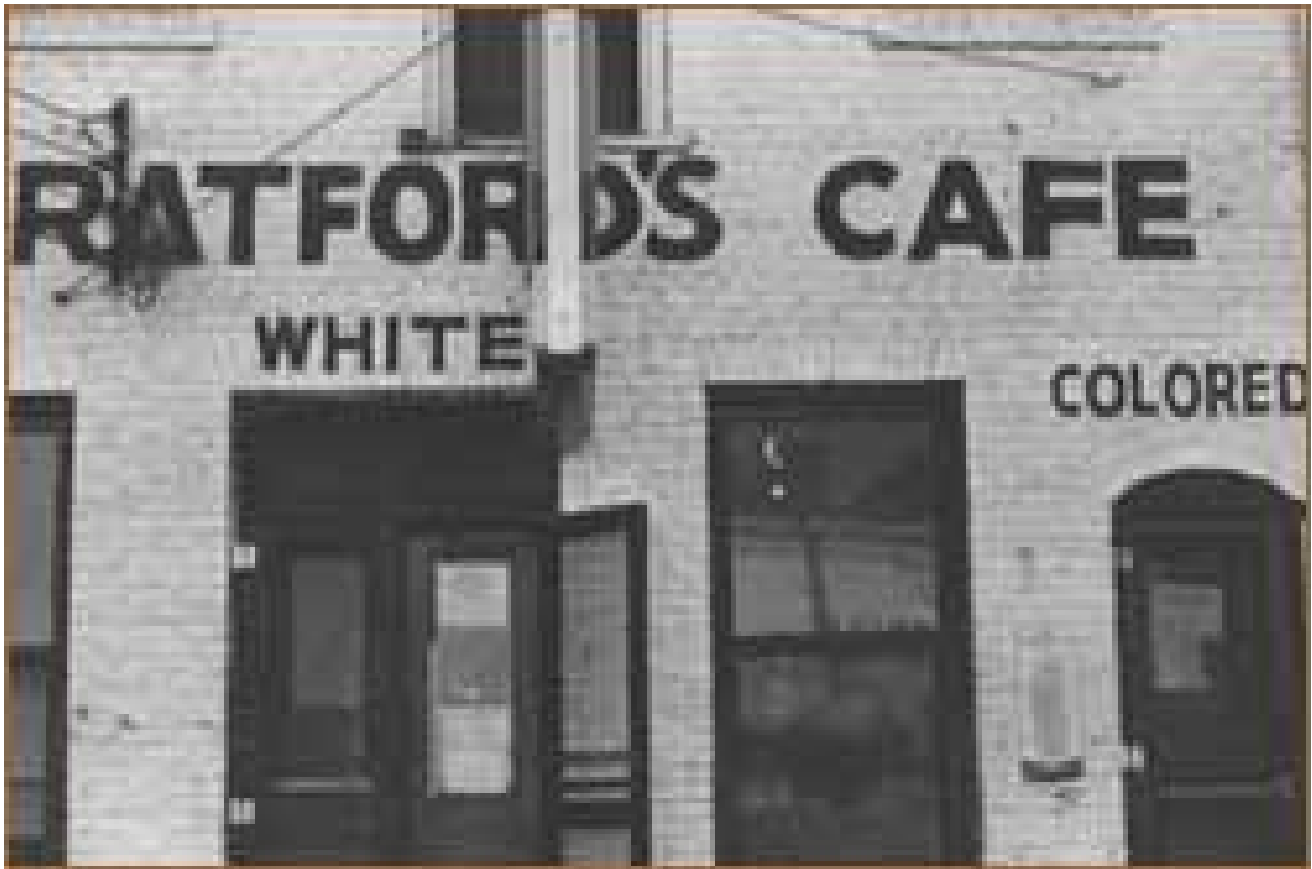


Journalist

Segregation in the U.S.



Even though the Constitution stated everyone was equal, segregation continued in the United States until the 1960s. It continued by segregating facilities, services, and opportunities such as housing, medical care, education, employment, and transportation.

Greensboro Sit-in



A civil rights protest where 4 young African-American students sat at a white lunch counter at Woolworth's in Greensboro, North Carolina, and refused to move after being denied service. This began a protest movement that spread across the South. These protests eventually were successful and forced many establishments to change segregationist policies.

Jim Crow Laws



These laws were put into place in the South after the Civil War. They were state and local laws that enforced racial segregation even though the Constitution stated all were equal.

Boycott



It is voluntary act of protest where people refrain from using, buying, or dealing with a person, organization, or country. It is usually done as a form moral, social or political protest.
