App developers are one of the most in demand careers in the world. This is because many companies sell their products or services on an app. The median salary for an app developer in 2019 was \$107,000.

To become an app developer, you will need to learn to code. "To code" means to use a computer language. A computer language is a series of instructions that tell a computer what to do. Examples of computer languages include Python and Javascript.

Today, you will imagine you are an app developer who is creating a new app to teach people about Alexander the Great, the famous ancient military leader. Follow the steps below.

Step 1: Learn About Alexander the Great

Read the passage below and answer the questions.

Alexander the Great: A World Conqueror

Early Life and Conquering Greece

Alexander the Great was born in 356 BCE. He was the son of Philip II, the King of Macedonia, who was known for his courage and skills as a military leader and ruler. Macedonia, located north of Greece, was an ancient kingdom that was known for its skilled warriors.

As a young boy, Alexander was trained in military combat and leadership. He learned to ride a horse and use weapons. He also studied with the great Greek philosopher Aristotle. By the age of 16, Alexander was a commander in the Macedonian army. At one point, he ruled Macedonia while his father went to war against Byzantium. At the age of 20, he joined his father in battle and defeated two of the most powerful Greek city-states, Thebes and Athens. Afterwards, when Phillip returned home, he partnered with the two defeated city-states

to join forces against the much larger and stronger Persian empire.

In 336 BCE, Philip II was assassinated. Alexander quickly claimed his right to the throne. He marched to Thebes after learning that some of the leaders were rebelling against him. He destroyed the city, killing and enslaving Thebans. His actions set an example for other Greek city-states as to what would happen if Alexander was challenged.

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Conquering the Persian Empire

After his success conquering the Greek city-states, Alexander set out to conquer the Persian Empire. This area consisted of the lands east of Macedonia, which were controlled by King Darius III. The Persian Empire was the largest empire in the world. In 334 BCE, Alexander invaded Asia Minor, also known as Anatolia. Today, this country is known as Turkey. Alexander marched with 37,000 foot soldiers and 5,000 horsemen. His troops won the battle. A year later, Alexander defeated the Persians at the battle of Issus, also in Asia Minor. King Darius III and many of his soldiers fled after the battle. From there, Alexander marched south where he captured Syria and Egypt, countries that were also part of the Persian Empire. The Egyptians hailed Alexander as a hero.

While in Egypt, Alexander founded the city of Alexandria. In Alexandria, he introduced Greek culture and philosophy to the Egyptians. He oversaw the building of one of the largest and most well-known libraries in the ancient world, the Library of Alexandria, which housed over 500,000 books and scrolls. Scholars from all over the world flocked to the city to visit the library. As Alexander helped open up trade routes to the East and West, Alexandria became known as an important center for business and trade.

Alexander Moves On

After leaving Egypt, Alexander continued to conquer cities in the Persian Empire. His next stop was Mesopotamia. In Mesopotamia, the Persians had assembled a large army of 250,000 men. However, Alexander's much smaller army, once again, defeated the Persians.

After leaving Mesopotamia, Alexander invaded the city of Babylon and Persepolis, the capital of the Persian Empire. Later, a fire broke out and burned the Persepolis to the ground. Although the cause of the fire was a mystery, some believed Alexander burned Persepolis down to show that the Persian Empire no longer existed.

By 327 BCE, Alexander turned his attention to India. Although he won a decisive battle in the Indus Valley, Alexander now faced a possible revolt among his soldiers. For 11 years, his men had traveled over 11,000 miles, enduring hardship after hardship. They were exhausted and wanted to go home. A disappointed Alexander agreed to turn back. In the spring of 323 BCE, he became ill with a fever and died. Alexander the Great was 32 years old.

Alexander's Legacy

It is hard to imagine what Alexander might have accomplished if had he lived longer. However, he still left behind an important legacy. He never lost a battle. He was one of the first to have his soldiers fight on horseback. This gave him an advantage in fighting against soldiers who fought on foot.

Alexander also founded over 70 cities and created an empire that spanned three continents. Many of these new cities were located on trade routes. This opened up the flow of people, goods, and ideas among different countries. For example, Greek culture, science and philosophy spread throughout Alexander's empire. Alexander also allowed people to freely practice their own religions and customs in his empire. In addition, people from different countries could join his armies.




