National Parks



National parks are parks in the United States that have been created by the government. The government created national parks so that it could keep the plants and animals that live in them safe.

Hawaii Volcanoes National Park



A national park on the island of Hawaii. The park has two of the world's most active volcanoes.

They are named Kīlauea and Mauna Loa.

Recreation



An activity that is done for fun. Biking, running, or camping are all types of recreation.



Career Highlight: Outdoor Recreation Planner

An **outdoor recreation planner** is a person who helps create safe activities for people to enjoy in the park.

The word "recreation" means an activity that is done for fun.

Outdoor recreation planners may create trails and campsites for visitors to use. They might also find spots in the park where visitors can safely do activities like swimming, boating, or hiking.

Outdoor recreation planners make sure that visitors are able to have fun while still staying safe!

Section 2:

Hawaii Volcanoes National Park

Imagine that you just got a job as an outdoor recreation planner at Hawaii Volcanoes National Park. Learn about Hawaii Volcanoes National Park on the next slides to prepare you for your role.

LOCATION:

Hawaii Volcanoes National Park is located on the island of Hawaii. This Hawaiian island is often called the "big island".





Hawaii Volcanoes National Park officially became a national park on August 1, 1916.

Hawaii Volcanoes National Park has two of the world's most active volcanoes called Kīlauea and Mauna Loa.

The creation of the park helps to protect and study the two volcanoes. It also allows visitors to safely view the volcanoes.

Hawaii Volcanoes National Park also gives visitors the ability to explore the plants and animals living in the areas as well as Hawaiian culture.







HISTORY:

- The Hawaiian islands were formed by volcanoes that have been erupting on the ocean floor for millions of years. Each time the volcano erupted, the lava cooled and made the islands bigger. After millions of years, the islands grew large enough that they were no longer covered by water.
- Polynesians from the Marquesas Islands were the first to come to Hawaii. The exact date they came is unknown and was between 800-1700 years ago.
- Hawaii became a part of the United States on August 21, 1959.





PLANTS:

Over 90% of the state's native plants can only be found in the Hawaiian Islands. The park has many ferns. There are around 200 species of ferns that can be found on the islands.

Other plants you might find in Hawaii Volcanoes National Park are the Mauna Loa Silverswords and the 'Ōhelo. The Mauna Loa Silverswords are special because they only grow in Hawaii. The 'Ōhelo makes berries that are used in foods by the Hawaiian people.

The Ōhi'a lehua are one of the most popular trees in the park. They grow well in a volcanic landscape like Hawai'i. You can also see other trees such as the Koa and Niu.

ANIMALS:

Birds

Many birds can be found in Hawaii. The Nēnē is the official state bird. Other common birds are the Apapane and the Hawaiian Petrel.

There are also many sea creatures that live off the coast of the park. Off the coast you may see Hawksbill Turtles, Humpback Whales, and the Hawaiian Monk Seal. The Hawaiian Monk Seal is one of the most endangered seal species in the world.





















Section 4: ELA Practice Cause and Effect
